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About me and ArtSnacks

I am a certified art instructor with thirteen years experience teaching in Kansas public schools. For the last five years days I have been an educational technology specialist at ESSDACK, which stands for Educational Services and Staff Development Association of Central Kansas. Each year I travel to many schools, helping leverage the power of web 2.0 and technology to help prepare learners for the future.

ArtSnacks is a social learning network that I started after experimenting with the delivery of virtual art lessons to public schools for two years. In our first model all lessons were synchronous or live and we had a full time art teacher. At the end of our research we knew that we could not afford a full time teacher for so few schools and that if we added enough schools to pay the bills, the quality of the instruction and the personal relationships with kids would evaporate. It was then that I decided to try a new approach to art instruction by creating a Ning network and beginning to build a community in which learners could grow and learn and teach. I created over 135 standards-aligned video art lessons that are between five and ten minutes long that teachers can use to engage their hands-on learners and members are beginning to contribute their own lessons in other areas. Leveraging the power of social networks, ArtSnacks allows artists to upload their art work and get feedback from other members. This gives us the opportunity to mentor kids and bring them along as they take those first nervous steps.

What I didn't expect at the outset were the myriad directions members would grow the network. Writers are sharing their work and supporting each other in the writer's block group while poets are posting their poems and getting feedback on the verbal pictures they paint. A band teacher is creating lessons on guitar and steel drum while a music teacher is teaching theory. One school did their school play live in the Art Snacks Coffee House and has garnered a larger audience of virtual theater goers than they had live for their performance. It is clear to me that the network will grow and change in accordance with the interests and wishes of it's members and that is as it should be. Web 2.0 is all about freedom and choices and accessing and creating learning in personal, customized ways. This being said, safety is always a concern in such an environment and we work hard to maintain a safe, positive virtual space for all ArtSnacks members. If you look around you will notice that we frame conversations and are overt about asking for positive conversation and appropriate content. It has been my experience that if we ask for certain behaviors, we often get them and I have been amazed and impressed by the way kids have treated one another here. We have student mentors who help bring younger kids along and build them up with positive, constructive comments on their work. Our network is a walled garden where you must be approved to get in and can be banned if you act in a cruel way or post inappropriate or non-rated G content. With

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hundreds of educators, administrators, artists and home school moms and dads participating, I believe that we have created a large enough family to look after it's self. Any member can report a concern at any time and we have plenty of administrators to keep an eye on the digital playground. While bad things can still happen as in any "bricks and mortar" school, there is always someone watching and helping even when I am offline.

I believe that it is crucial for educators to play on the digital playground. Our kids are already there and if we want to be helpful and relevant to them and their futures, we must walk boldly out and join them. It does take a village to mentor kids and those mentors don't have to be adults. Teaching kids to mentor is a large part of the curriculum here.



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
